WHAT STANDS OUT:

2021 Wines

I have said to folks many, many times at this point, “When we start showing and talking about these wines everyone is going to think we are a pack of liars.” Well, that point in time is now. Anyone living on the west coast can testify how crazy the summer of 2021 was at a couple of different points last year. Heat Dome sounds more like a Roland Emmerich film than an actual weather event that occurred up and down the western part of North America in June. The high temperature recorded in Newberg during that stretch is now higher than the highest temperature *ever* recorded in Las Vegas, NV! Unofficially the temps reached 119 F here at the winery. If you have never been in 119 degree weather I can tell you that it’s the difference between feeling like it is really, crazy hot out and feeling like if you don’t get inside right away there is a chance you might perish.

Yet, somehow the wines from this vintage display none of the characteristics one would expect from a hotter (well, the hottest ever) vintage. These are wines of low to moderate alcohols, excellent levels of acidity, very nice tannin structures and terrific overall balance, all while having a level of intensity that seems exceptional, but not out of character. Our neighbor, Mike Etzel, described this vintage as a collection of the greatest wines he has ever worked with. It is still early in the process,

but in a winery that has such a large concentration of historic old vine sites it is hard not to lean into the sentiments of our wizardly old friend with whom we share a hillside. If you have tasted any of the newly released spring white and pink wines, you know they have exceptional freshness to them.

Fermentations were extraordinarily active, volcanic even, with nearly each fermenter having large amounts of frothy, pink foam at the height of their activity. This is a very good sign. Every year some small percentage of fermenters will have this sort of rollicking action going on, but the only other vintage I can recall seeing this across the breadth of fermenters was 1999. Many who read this may not know the history of Oregon vintages well enough to know what that means around these parts. 1999 was a late vintage where an epic October allowed for picking into November. The wines from the 1999 vintage were, by many in the business, considered to be the strongest batch from the decade and on any Oregon wine historian’s list of great vintages it is going to be listed somewhere. That would be, at worst, the starting point for the potential quality of the 2021 vintage wines.

In any case, we are going with telling the truth, our truth about these wines. Believe and expose yourselves to the largest collection of vineyard designated Pinot Noirs in America!

2021 FUTURES OFFERINGS

Freedom Hill Vineyard, Dijon 115 Clone Pinot Noir: Simply perfect material from the East Liberty Block of the vineyard planted in 2004. While we have always used 50-100% whole cluster fermentation on this bottling since its inception in 2012 we felt like this was going to be better served in 2021 by being done entirely destemmed. It was certainly a different type of year and some things needed to be adjusted to best play the cards that we were dealt. This is very much like the choice we made with the Wadensvil Block bottling in 2019 where we entirely destemmed it just a vintage after fermenting it all 100% whole cluster. Regardless, this is still a wine that shows its powerful and dark side in its youth. It is also one in which considerable charms appear given some bottle aging. This might be the sneakiest great wine we make with exceptionally floral aromatics cut with minerality. This is wonderfully dark in fruit while still dragging red fruit components along. The structure is bold and dense without being scratchy or hard. There have only been a handful of Freedom Hill clonal bottlings that have not seen some element of whole cluster, so this rare bird definitely emphasizes that wild fruit and delicious exuberance this vineyard naturally has at its disposal. This is going to be a wonderful example of purity, subtle power and intensity of the 2021 vintage.

Anderson Family Vineyard Pinot Noir: Up until this point, we have only produced the 2019 bottling. While we get a decent amount of fruit from this completely unique Dundee Hills site, we just dipped our toe into the production of it, by choosing our 10 favorite barrels in our inaugural vintage. This is such an excellent addition to our portfolio, as it is very different from all the other Dundee Hills sites we source from. The site is atop and rolls down what would be described as a "mini-butte" in the very most northeastern corner of the AVA. This hillside that the vineyard is planted 270 degrees around was created by an ancient landslide and the whole, steep hill is essentially a pile of softball sized basalt stones! This allows for a wine that has the fruit-born characteristics of the Dundee Hills while being slightly firmer in a very good way. Since we are feeling unfettered with this wine at this juncture, we have the full complement of Dijon 115, Pommard, Wadensvil and Dijon 667 that we source from the Andersons at our disposal to create the most interesting and delicious wine possible. The 2021 wine in barrel includes all of the clones, and is intense, rich, deep and delicious. The 2019 has really been a revelation, but the 2021 should be what we will consider to be our benchmark for this bottling.

Estate Vineyard, Wadensvil Block Pinot Noir: We have been telling the story of this block of the vineyard for quite some time now. While we have been producing it consistently since 2015 (2020 excepted) the block dates back to its planting in 1997. Overcropped in its first year of production (1999) the full 3 acres was in dire straits when we purchased the vineyard in 2000. Several years of careful work went into nursing the plants back to health and another several years to begin to coax out the potential from this multi-sloped section in the very back of the vineyard. In 2021 the June heat dome actually accelerated the growth in plants along the top spine of the vineyard. The Wadensvil blocks run nearly the breadth of the site and, thus, a portion at the very top was picked a few days earlier than the fruit on the sides. This left the steeply sloping western portion and lightly sloping eastern portion to be picked and fermented separately as well. We have a fascinating array of fermenters, fermentations and barrels to choose from to pick out what we are certain is going to be the most amazing bottling we have ever done from this block. There is a wealth of intensity, structure and a mélange of both red and black fruits. They will all come together in the final bottling to create a wine that is true to this site and spectacular on its own. This is a phenomenal and unique bottling.

Hyland Vineyard, Coury Clone Pinot Noir: This is one of the most historically revered and iconic vineyards in Oregon. Originally planted in 1972 on a steep hillside above Muddy Valley Rd. southwest of McMinnville, this vineyard was daring for its pitch, elevation and for the fact that it was well outside of the Dundee Hills where the vast majority of quality vineyards were being planted at the time. We dumb-lucked our way into the vineyard in 2017 and now after just 3 bottlings this has clearly been established as one of our top wines with the 2019 garnering a 96-point rating from Josh Reynolds of Vinous.com. In 2021 we were able to amplify the potential of this already tremendous bottling by adding 2 acres from the original 1972 Coury Clone planting. These gnarled old vines are a sight to behold and at 50 years of vine age they are still producing with no sign of drop off. We now have the ability to combine the wine from these two interesting and unique blocks. This wine will be a fascinating encapsulation of the unique attributes of the Coury Clone, the excellence of the site, the high-quality organic farming and the history of the Oregon grape growing and wine industry. This is a red-fruited wine whose glory lies in its sneaky persistence and utterly unique aromatic characteristics.



Mysterious Pinot Noir: The six previous vintages we have received this fruit are 2009, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019. This as-of-yet-but-possibly-soon-to-be-revealed vineyard brings the “WOW” factor every year. The fact that it does in this vintage says something beyond what we already knew about the special nature of this site. Even in a cellar loaded with great vineyards and great wines this pops in every sensory category. Just a spectacular wine of grace, richness, balance and burgeoning complexity. As an example, the 2009 recently tasted in a line-up of serious heavy hitter Burgs from a single Grand Cru site, and it held its own and then some. The 2019 Mysterious just received a rating of 97 points from Josh Raynolds of Vinous.com. The 2021 version of this bottling is entirely destemmed evoking memories of the intense yet taught 2016 bottling which most certainly set the stage for the last three vintages. The destemmed barrels bring an amazing intensity and suppleness of fruit without the sort of sweetness in the flavors one would expect from such a concentrated wine. This is simply one of the greatest vineyards in America: **ARCUS VINEYARD**. We are fortunate to receive this fruit on a regular basis now.

2021 Wind Ridge Vineyard Pinot Noir: In 1995 Harry and Judy Peterson-Nedry purchased this 60-acre lot, formerly a peach orchard, adjacent to their already established Ridgecrest Vineyard on Ribbon Ridge Rd. Beginning in 2003 the property was planted into what is now a 19-acre vineyard. The dry marine soil for which the AVA is known combined with the prevailing climate, for which the vineyard is named, to produce a distinct style of Pinot Noir. This is a site that’s only just coming into its own, however because of its location and ownership, it is still an amazing piece of Oregon’s viticultural history. We have been receiving this fruit since 2018, but wanted to wait until we had the perfect blend of maturing vines, fermentation style and the right vintage before we bottled this wine on its own. Despite residing along a cool, forested part of

the property this vineyard wants to be picked deceptively earlier than one would expect. The Pommard Clone, soil, elevation and discrete use of whole clusters combine in a beautiful, lithe but dense fashion allowing the darker toned fruit Ribbon Ridge is known for to interlace with some distinct tannic structure. We are incredibly pleased to be able to add this bottling to our line-up of vineyards that have significance in the history of the Oregon wine industry. Over the past five decades the Peterson-Nedry family has been a great source of vineyard and wine knowledge and we are proud to partner with them.

Chehalem Mountain Vineyard, Wadensvil Clone Pinot Noir: This is where our bread is buttered. I used to say that about our Pommard clone wines and while that is still the lion’s share of the overall cellar volume there is no doubt that Wadensvil is the queen of our cellar. A very high percentage of Wadensvil barrels not only go into single vineyard bottlings, they go into bottlings specifically labeled as Wadensvil. Especially when sourced from Marine soils, (Corrine and the Estate are likewise Marine soils, albeit a different type than Freedom Hill.) Wadensvil produces incredibly intriguing and complex wines. Patty and I first noticed this when receiving fruit from Shea Vineyard in 2001 and ever since then we have made it a specific mission to search and obtain this soil/clone combination. We dipped our toe into the water with this nearby vineyard in 2019. This site is the vineyard originally planted by Dick Erath when he moved to Oregon in 1968. The vineyard has been through many new plantings and re-plantings, as well as a variety of ownerships. In late 2021 Cooper Mountain Winery, who also owns Corrine Vineyard, purchased this site. We will continue to get fruit from the multiple blocks we now source from. This bottling is particularly dark, structured and intense while still showing the purity of fruit that we expect from this clone. This is a very special bottling that will last and evolve for ages.
