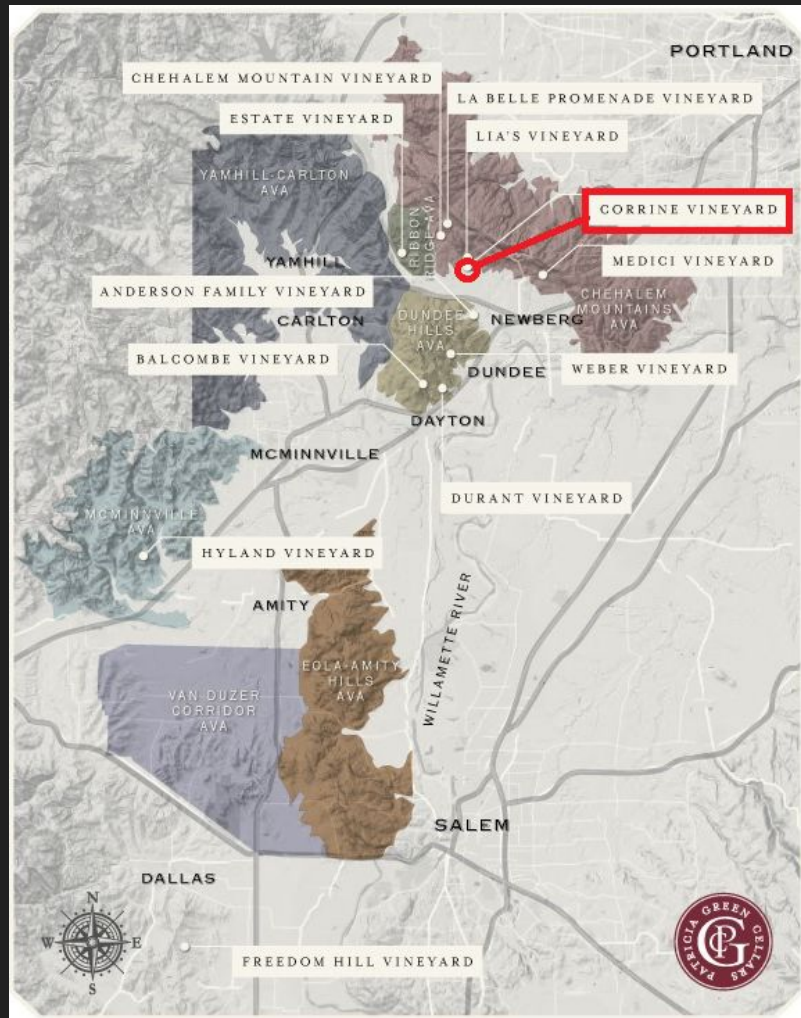

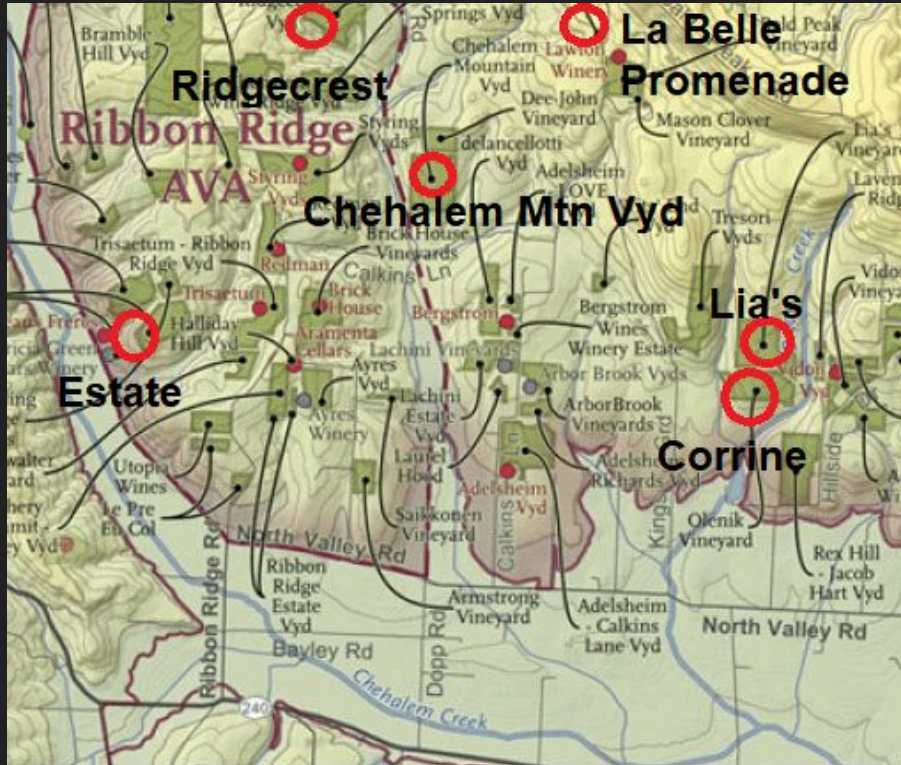
# Olenik Vineyard

# Chehalem Mountains AVA



From Parrett Mountain to the south, and running northwest across Bald Peak and Ribbon Ridge, the Chehalem Mountains were formed by uplifted sedimentary seabeds, lava flows, and wind-blown silt to create the highest elevations and most diverse soils in wine country.

# Olenik (Corrine) Vineyard

- Initially planted by the original owners of Rex Hill, Paul Hart and Jan Jacobsen, as Jacob-Hart Vineyard in 1987.
- South facing hillside in the central part of the Chehalem Mountains AVA, around 325' elevation.
- Sits is a marine sedimentary soil area that, in parts, is also loaded with a quarry full of softball and greater sized basalt chunks
- Two Pinot Noirs produced:
  - Olenik Vineyard, Wadnesvil Block
  - Olenik Vineyard, Anklebreaker Block

# 2018 Olenik Vineyard, Anklebreaker Block

SOIL TYPE: Willakenzie (marine sedimentary)

CLONAL MATERIAL: Pommard

PICKING DATE: 9/22/2018

TONS/ACRE: 3.33

YEAR PLANTED: 2007

VINIFICATION: 2 open-top fermenters, a 1.75 ton and a 2.5 ton, the former with 40% whole clusters the latter with 60% whole clusters.

This is a lower lying, rock strewn section of the vineyard. It is definitely the warmest spot on the site with the radiant heat from the rocks. This section was picked early on in the 2018 harvest at a moderate level of brix belying this wine's deep, dark color and powerful overall nature. It is a broad-shouldered Pinot Noir with deep and very dark fruit flavors. Years away from any sort of peak, it certainly provides satisfaction at the big-boy level in the short run. Of all the wines in this very diverse cellar this is the most about the place that fruit comes from style of Pinot Noir.
